Garden News

We have been busy planning, and starting seeds for our container garden. We wanted to try a variety of new planting mediums and growing a different variety of some vegetables. We have received a lot of help from Tess and Andy. We also received a pack of seeds from Nancy Hummingbird from Second Glance Farms in Bagley, MN. Nancy had heard that we wanted new varieties of seeds and she sent us Rainbow Corn, 3 varieties of beans, zucchini, mini pumpkins and Geta Okosomin- a winter squash variety that has a very interesting story!

Milgwech to Nancy! We will be sending a thank you card from our students.

Some of the ways we started seeds this year are: We are trying seed arrays; we used non-toxic school glue to attach seeds to a paper towel, we will then just set on top of the soil and then cover with dirt. This is a great way to start small seeds. We are also using sponges (no soil needed!), paper pots (repurposing newspaper), egg cartons, milk jug greenhouses and rain gutters (to grow plants that hate to be transplanted, we just dig a trench and slide the plants off). The upper grades are growing watercress on the surface of their fish tank (their first attempt at aquaponics!)

This year the 4th and 5th graders decided they would grow asema for our school. They understand that growing this sacred crop is a responsibility and a commitment. We talked about being in a "good" place even while planting is important. The commitment they agreed on is that they will take responsibility for caring for, harvesting, drying and saving seeds for the next years' growth. They will then pass this very important job to other students when they move to another school.

The second week of May Ms. Bridget will be testing all of the students in the last round of the Fountas and Pinnell reading assessments. The students really work hard on these tests, and many have shown great progress.
