We have had some guests come into our room this month. Margaret Noodin and some of her colleagues came in to teach the students a new color Ojibwe game. The students responded well, and they enjoyed playing the game. Sometimes for our brain breaks, we will play the game. We also had Ms. Tess come in and teach us about the November moon (Gashkadino Giizis). They learned about the sunchoke and how it is used. They learned how to preserve foods and the nutrients found in sunchokes. At the end of the lesson, she gave everyone a sample and most of the students liked it. WTIP came to our classroom as well. She asked the K-1 students what they liked about winter and what they were thankful for. They sent us the link and we listened to it in class, and they liked hearing themselves and their classmates on the radio. We made bird feeders out of toilet paper rolls. They spread the peanut butter around the toilet paper roll and then they put seed around it. We put them outside our classroom window. Our goal is to observe the

different kinds of birds that visit and record it in our nature journal. It has been an eventful month.





