

Reading Aloud to Build Literacy Skills



When providing reading instruction, I use a multisensory approach; meaning I engage more than one sense at a time. Utilizing visual, auditory, and kinesthetic-tactile pathways (hands-on activities) can enhance memory and the ability to learn. I use research-based approaches to learning and research shows that reading aloud is the most impactful component to building literacy skills. Reading aloud builds vocabulary, improves comprehension and active listening, helps develop social emotional skills, strengthens fluency, and can improve working memory. In my approach, I read aloud to students, and they read aloud to me. One of the texts we are reading is the *JoJo Makoons* series featuring a 1st grade student living on an Ojibwe Reservation, and incorporates some Ojibwemowin, written by Dawn Quigley, a member of the Turtle Mountain Band of Ojibwe, ND

Social Emotional Learning

One of the ways we are developing social emotional learning (SEL) skills this school year, is a daily “Lunch Bunch.” Each day, 4 different students join me for a small lunch group. Participating in a Lunch Bunch can help students feel seen, build positive coping skills, form trusting relationships, and it gives students space to open up and interact socially in a more relaxed setting. During



Lunch Bunch we work on social skills, problem solving and conflict resolution (which can be helpful right after recess!), self-esteem, building a growth mindset, talk about personal interests, and cultural identity in a relaxed atmosphere where students don't feel like they are “working” but feel like they are having fun and getting to have a special lunch with friends (which is also true!). The groups are often mixed from multiple classrooms, so students have an opportunity to spend time with a variety of peers from different grade levels. Lunch Bunch is for all students, they self-select to participate (and it has become very popular!). Lunch Bunch fosters development of friendship skills and promotes a positive sense of self. We are building community and relationships one lunch at a time!

Ojibwemowin: Ms. James

All classes were able to visit the **Miinan Village** this month and learn about the trees of Grand Portage. We were fortunate to have Matt Tyler and Eric Carlson from Grand Portage Forestry guide us on our hike to the Miinan Village. Along the way the students were able to identify and learn about some of the local trees.

Before the field trip, we had a short unit about the Mitigoog Gichi-onigamiing (Trees of Grand Portage). We read a traditional story about the Mashkiiwaatig (Tamarack) and the



Bapakwanagemag (Red Pine). By the end of the year, our goal is to learn to say most of the trees of Grand Portage in Ojibwe and to identify them.
