# **Emerging Literacy Skills**



To provide students additional support in reading, I first assess to determine where they are at and meet them there to build upon their skills and continue with weekly progress monitoring. We focus on letter knowledge (identification and letter sounds), phonemic awareness (the ability to notice, think about and work with individual sounds in words), and dialogic reading (talking about what we are reading as we read). Repetition builds upon these skills and builds confidence in emerging readers. I read aloud to students, and they practice reading the same texts to me aloud.

Students learn best through hands- on, interactive learning and we incorporate this into our literacy work. Finding stories that are interesting and relevant to the

students helps to keep students engaged. Fun and laughter are important ingredients to the process to instill a joy for reading!

Social Emotional Learning

The Zones of Regulation is a research-based Social Emotional Learning (SEL) curriculum that I use with students to support self-regulation skills. We start by learning to identify emotions. Recognizing and understanding emotions in ourselves and others builds emotional intelligence, which is a combination of self-awareness and empathy. The Zones help students identify their emotions and learn strategies to develop selfregulation skills so they can manage big feelings in

a healthy, supportive manner. We learn that there are no good or bad emotions or Zones, that we will all experience the full range of emotions. The Green Zone is the Learning Zone, where students are calm, content, ready to focus and learn and we work on strategies to help students get back to the Green Zone when it is time to be in class and engaged in learning. The Zones

supports students in managing anxiety and other big feelings, supports positive social interactions, and fosters development of a positive self-concept through empowering students to realize they are in control of their minds and bodies. # THIS MONTH

This has been a great month! We have been working on social emotional learning. They have learned about growth mindset, empathy, perseverance, gratitude, and mindfulness. We have been on some field trips this month. They went on a leaf walk on Rengo Road. During the walk they drew and wrote down observations in their nature journal. When we got back from the field trip they made an acrostic poem from their observations. We also went to the Spirit Tree as a whole school and they drew the Spirit Tree. We have been doing some cool experiments in class. Their favorite ones are the pumpkin experiment and the germ experiment. We put two pumpkins in a closed container and we are watching all the stages of the pumpkin, from whole pumpkin, to rotting, to the seeds planting themselves, and regrowing. They named them Pablo and Pepper. For our germ project, they swabbed ten different places and we are observing them over several days to see which one had the most bacteria. In art class we learn about a new artist and then they create art inspired by that artist. We have learned about four new artists and their style. We celebrated Oliver's birthday
